It is that sense of kinship that I think we all feel with the amazing young women at St. Aloysius and their teachers, mentors, and beloved principal, Maria Theresa. Thanks to the wonders of technology, we were able to talk with Maria Theresa as we drove home. Her pride and commitment to bringing the best to her students and their families came through clearly, despite her exhaustion after a very long day. A lot is happening this week with the focus being an upcoming music/singing competition in nearby Masaka. It is impossible not to show our concern for the safety of staff and students given reports of violence at other locations. Sr. Maria Theresa shared that there are students currently at St. A who are from the community recently in the news and of course are traumatized by reports from Lhubiriha Secondary School in Mpondwe. However, she assured us that St. Aloysius has security both day and night and security cameras that we helped finance after the mother house was broken into. They are taking every precaution to assure the school's safety. She is grateful for all the love, scholarship

support and prayers for continued success and safety.
