Also Sr. Maria Theresa writes of how busy they are at school. The enrollment is now up to 414 students as more parents are enrolling their daughters as conditions for crops in the region improve. This week-end's (July 15-16, 2023) experience took me back to the fond memories of 2005 when Sr. Immaculate Kyampeire and I were first invited to this parish by Fr. Jack Morris. We received such a warm welcome then as I did this visit. The major reason for my coming to you this summer was to say to you these only two words: "THANK YOU." The words "thank you" may look simple in one's comprehension but they elucidate a lot in terms of appreciation or gratitude especially for your sacrifice and oneness with us.

Particularly, I want to acknowledge the scholarships you offer to our needy students at St. Aloysius Secondary School in Uganda, one of our schools. While supporting the students, you lend a hand to us as the Daughters of Mary Sisters too. The name we bear as an institute of "the Daughters of Mary Sisters," is truly a call to be mothers like our Blessed Mother Mary; "like a mother, like a daughter." One biblical example of the motherhood of Mary was exemplified at the wedding of Cana where she told her Son Jesus,

"They have no wine," (In 2:3). As the Blessed Mother Mary cared for the people at the wedding of Cana, so are we called to look for the wine for the people we serve in all our ministries today. The deeper meaning of the word "wine," is the needs (problems) of the people we serve. In the same spirit of the Motherhood of Mary, we minister to others. We serve in 68 schools in the Eastern African region. In most of these schools the biggest percentage of the students cannot afford to pay their tuition and some other necessities of life, but we cannot send them away. We struggle to help them. The truth is that we cannot meet all their needs. We endeavor to help them until there is nothing remaining in our capacity. That is why we feel indebted to you, people of qoodwill, who support us in loving, caring, and looking after these children. You help us in our struggle to be the good mothers that we are called to be towards these students.

We serve in 68 schools in the Eastern African region. In most of these schools the biggest percentage of the students cannot afford to pay their tuition and some other necessities of life, but we cannot send them away.

Whatever you contribute makes a great impact in their lives. Their future is brightened by the education you give to them that subsequently may touch others in our society too!

For "we are, because you are," in other words, you help us to be (African Philosophy by John Mbiti) which is reflected much in Mt 25:40 – Whatsoever you do to the least of those people, you do it to God.

It costs \$500 a year for tuition, room, board and uniform. The extra \$100 is to cover increased cost of teacher salaries.
