Joyful Easter Blessings to all! Life has changed for all of us. There are so many needs everywhere and so many worthy causes that it can be overwhelming. Thank you to so many who contributed in March to St Aloysius. \$2500 was mailed Monday April 7th and Holy Rosary church will wire the money to the St Aloysius account in Uganda next Wednesday.

In answer to some questions, Sister Immaculate writes: Our five students still here (total orphans), and four sisters are trying to maintain St Aloysius, and work in the fields.

I just heard from Sister this morning and paraphrasing her worries: Many parents have been out of work and will not have any money to pay tuition. We carry on, and because you help us so much, we will have food for our girls when they return. My biggest worry now is how to pay the teachers and staff when school starts up again as they will be needy too...

One of our parishioners has recently sent a special contribution of \$500 to help Sister through the Covid-19 crisis. If anyone else would like to send a special contribution, we will do our best to get money to Sister in a timely manner!

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S OFFICE....

Dear Friends! Thank you for the support you have given! I took your advice in February to prepare when I thought my girls would be quarantined here. We



were surprised that the president said that **all boarding school students must be sent home!** As they were leaving, some girls asked for food to take home because they knew there would not be much food to eat in the future at their homes when no one could work and that has already come true. Our people in Uganda are already crying out to government to give them some food. People are not working and they need money to buy food. You see, most people are

day workers which means that each day they make enough money to buy food for that one day. It is very hard here to get ahead. Our president says that food help is on the way. I am sure many of our girls will come back when they have lost weight due to some level of starvation. I am so afraid more will die of hunger while waiting out the virus. We are planning that the girls will be coming back to school and classes can start up by the end of April.

In the meantime, we are busy weeding the maize and cleaning the banana plantation. We have planted cassava [root vegetable] and are planting some other vegetables so that when life is back to normal we can have some food for our girls and can also help to feed the people who will come to us for aid. The work in the fields is never ending for us!

We are surely scratching our heads on how to handle the situation when teachers and students return. They sit close to each other in classes. They sleep close to each other. It will be tricky. Please keep us in your prayers!



- No seizing properties due to non loan payment







On the 15th of each month, checks will be deposited into the account for Sr Immaculate, then wired to Uganda. She will use the money to buy food for the girls, pay teachers and continue building projects. Forty dollars sent each month can keep a girl in school! It costs \$450 a year for tuition, room, board and uniform.
