A message from St. Mary by the Sea.... Uganda Team... August 16, 2022

You may have noticed in the pictures that you often see some girls in light blue uniform skirts and others in dark blue. These colors represent their academic levels. When they enter as S-1 students, (7th grade), they are given a dark blue wraparound skirt and white blouse, a blue skort for athletics, and a blue "house dress" to last them four years, through 10th grade. At the end of 10th grade, girls will take their O-level exams and graduate with an Ordinary High School diploma. Many girls opt to leave school after earning a O-level diploma.

If a girls decides to continue for 2 more years in preparation of college, they become S-5 students, (11th graders) or upperclassmen and receive a new light blue skirt, and a white house dress to last them for the next two years. At the end of their S6 (12th grade) year they take their advanced level exams or "A" level exams to graduate. So the light blue skirts you see in the pictures are always worn by girls who are the upper class students. It's a goal all the younger students look forward to receiving and a leadership responsibility the upper class students take seriously.

Thanks to all who support scholarships for students at St. Aloysius! Were it not for the scholarships these girls would not be able to continue their education. Remember, schooling is optional following

6th grade in Uganda. Weebale!
